



## HP df300a2 and df820 series Digital Photo Frames

Take your pick from these two digital photo frames from HP: The 3.5-inch df300ad and the 8-inch df820 series. The df300ad can store up to 45 photos (JPEG) which you can view on its 320 x 240 resolution screen with 4:3 aspect ratio and 400:1 contrast. It has an internal rechargeable battery that can be powered via your PC's USB port and supports SD, SDHC and MMC memory cards. The df820 has a bigger resolution of 800 x 600 courtesy of its 8-inch screen as well as a 250cd/m2 brightness rating. It allows you to view videos and listen to MP3s in addition to viewing photos with up to 512MB internal memory and support for a host of memory cards such as CF, SD and MMC to name a few. It also has built-in stereo speakers and comes with a remote control that gives personal entertainment a whole new meaning.

## SonicGear ENZO 100

SonicGear calls the ENZO 100 a high-energy audio system with two 1.25-inch full-range dedicated SonicGear satellite drivers. It has a total system power of 4W with a high-efficiency digital amplifier. The nifty little feature of delivering audio and power via USB shouldn't be overlooked as it minimizes cable hassle. It also has a standard 3.5mm stereo jack for use with other audio sources such as an MP3 or CD player. It has a volume control knob that's surrounded by a blue LED light that indicates if it's powered on.

## Sensonic F50

If you're looking for a set of desktop speakers that look and sound good without breaking the bank, one name that stands out has to be Sensonic. The F50 is a classy looking 2.1 speaker system from Sensonic that's available in two colours: Piano Black and Piano White. It has treble, bass and volume controls located on the front of the subwoofer that's easily within reach, removing the need to reach behind and twiddle in the dark. The F50 has a frequency response range of 50Hz-20KHz and will wow your audio senses with its performance courtesy of the subwoofer's 3-inch driver and the satellites 2.75-inch drivers, belying its compact size. The subwoofer measures just 120 mm wide and 130mm tall while each satellite measures 75mm wide and 100mm tall, capable of easily squeezing its way onto minimal desktop real estate.

## Sensonic F70

Sensonic manages to take it to a whole new level with the F70. It's clearly a step up from the F60 with an imposing looking subwoofer. The controls located on top of the subwoofer with a foundation of blue LED indicator lights that make them a visual treat when the speaker's turned on. The subwoofer boasts of a 5.25-inch driver while the satellites are a class apart, equipped with 3.75-inch drivers. The F70 retails the same frequency range as the F60 at 30Hz-20KHz but treble and bass will see marked improvements with bigger drivers. Premium sound calls for premium size but you really need to make room for them if you want to shake your senses to the core.

## Sensonic F60

If you're looking for something that goes a bit further than what the F50 offers, check out the Sensonic F60 which boasts of bigger drivers and more power. The F60 is better equipped to handle low-range notes, courtesy of a wider frequency range of 30Hz-20KHz. The subwoofer looks bigger and meaner too, this one equipped with a 5-inch bass driver while each satellite takes care of things on their end with 3-inch drivers that make the F60 a compelling listen. Sensonic has kept things relatively tight with the F60 still managing to keep size to a minimum. The subwoofer's wider than the F50 at 270mm and taller at 190mm with a 150mm diameter. With such a snazzy design though, we'd gladly make room on our desk, if only to impress visitors.
