But if you've blown the budget on the latter two, the puny pair of portable speakers just won't do. Firstly, try sweet-talking the neighbour into lending you his towering speakers by persuading him you'd call it our house party. But if that doesn't work, dash over to the digital mall and nab a pair of these F70s. Wielding dual satellite speakers for sharp, dinky trebles and a 4Ω bass-thumping subwoofer, the 2.1 pairing should chug out an earful of blasted tunes, suffice to keep the crowd jiggling all night, or at least till the beer and chips run out.

## Sensonic F50 RM129

Who are we kidding? Size matters, and when it comes to carry-home speakers, the white coats at Sensonic have cracked the formula. A shrinking ray coupled with a trusty hammer squeezes the typical music machine into a space-saving contraption. Petite it may be, the F50 still throws an impressive orchestra and kicks the beats with its 3in sub.



## Sensonic S22 RM39

Taking a break from the F-ers, the S22 is the epitome of a dress-downed loudmouth. With 2.5W RMS at each block sounding out frequencies of 60Hz – 20 KHz, the perky pair should prove a tasty replacement over built-in notebook speakers anytime of day.



## Sensonic F60 RM189

It may not be the fighter plane booming across your left-to-right earlobes, but it'll still cause quite a racket. The F60 trundles through with a solid basstronic set up that rocks a heartbeat-skipping 15W RMS subwoofer at 30Hz – 20KHz. We say, pair it with the right "piew-piew" flight shooters or adrenaline-filled FPSers and you'd be buzzing in the noggin for hours to come.
